Churchwarden's Reports

In January the vacancy began and a series of meetings was held over the next few months to create and agree the Parish Profile.

We extend our huge thanks to Peter for all his hard work during this time. Also thank you to Barbara, David and Alison our occasional preachers, and to visiting clergy, as well as deputy wardens and all who have contributed towards the smooth running of St John's over the past year.

The organ continues to cause problems, but many thanks must go to our Organist, Carol Mitchell, for managing to keep us all in good voice, and to Sarah for occasionally filling in by playing the piano for us.

The Easter season began with a concert by the U3A choir. On Maundy Thursday we held our Agape Meal and then on Good Friday Peter and Barbara led the thought provoking – Stations of the Cross session. This culminated in our Easter morning worship services.

The weather was kind for the annual Village Fete in June which was successful and enjoyable.

Judy and Jackie attended the Annual Church Warden's Visitation Service held at St Nicholas Church in Pepperharrow. Then on the 30th of June we all enjoyed a BBQ at Borough Farm, and two weeks later we returned for a lovely afternoon of Tea and Swimming. Many thanks to John and Nicki for the hospitality.

In September the advert for a new Incumbent was ready for inclusion in the Church Times, but unfortunately to no avail

Autumn continued with our Harvest Festival, annual Quiz Night and Remembrance Day service.

An early start to Christmas celebrations began with the switching on of the lights on the Christmas Tree at the Village Hall. Then a week later we held our Toy Service to support Chase Hospice. A new venture this year was the Christmas Tree display in the Church, which looked very impressive. Our thanks to Frances and Alan and all who were involved, especially Pam Hewson who worked hard at this as well as the "Fun Quiz" and Wreath Making session to raise money for the Glass Door Project. Another U3A Concert was held in December which raised a generous amount of money for St John's. Then followed the

Rodborough School Carol Concert, the St John's Carol service, Crib Service, Midnight Service and two Holy Communion services on Christmas Day morning.

At the beginning of the year the total was 138 but there were 3 deaths in March, August and September. A family of 4 members had also moved away in July but during the year we had 3 new members so at the end of the year the number stood at 134.

As a new Electoral Roll has to be done every 6 years, we will have to do a new one in 2025.

PCC Secretary's Report

During 2024, and during the Vacancy, the Parochial Church Council has continued to meet on average once every two months so this year we totalled 7 meetings, all held in the Church Centre. We also held 1 special PCC meeting which was convened to decide what sort of ministry we wanted.

Each meeting has an agenda, which gives the opportunity for the Clergy, Churchwardens and Treasurer to report to the committee as well as comments on various aspects of Church life such as Electoral Roll numbers, Deanery Synod, Mission, Schools, Work with Young People, Buildings and Maintenance, Fund Raising etc. As well as the regular meetings we also held a shorter meeting a few days after the APCM to commission the PCC and also remind members of the various aspects of their work.

We have also had general discussions on subjects such as how the Christmas season went; the APCM; Church finances (a continual source of discussion including the Parish Share increase and how to deal with it); the Quinquennial Inspection Report and what to do; the Village Hall Lease renewal and what to do about the noticeboard in the Churchyard.

However, the subject of the Vacancy has been an item on the Agenda for every meeting. First, we had to decide what we wanted, then we had to draft our Statement of Needs and get it approved by the Diocese, and then we could draft our advert and also get Diocesan approval. At the meeting in January, we had Bishop Paul and Area Dean present for the first part of the meeting and then in May we had Archdeacon Catharine and Area Dean Chris present for the first part of the meeting.

At the January Special Meeting, the PCC voted to go for a half-time minister rather than a full-time post or a house-for-duty post. At the meeting on the 6th of March the PCC agreed to the sale of some restricted funds to pay off all outstanding Parish Share arrears once a new Incumbent is appointed. It subsequently agreed to a sale of a £30,000 portion of the Miss Price Bequest fund. On the 19th of June the PCC agreed that a large Gift Aid donation of £10,000 should be dedicated to the Glass Door Project.

The following policies were reviewed: -

- Baptism
- Garden of Remembrance & Book of Remembrance

During the year we lost 6 members: 1 resignation in January; 2 retirees at the APCM; 1 resignation in March; I resignation in April and 1 in June (the family moved away). However, we had 2 elections at the APCM and 1 co-option who has agreed to be elected at the 2025 APCM.

Financial Review - Year ended 31st December 2024

Summary

Our Parish Share was due to rise by £9,675 to £82,839 in 2024 with the last of the large transitional increases. The decision by the PCC to go for a part-time post (0.5 FTE) meant that our Parish Share was reduced to £63,286. At the start of the year, we owed £8,024 in unpaid Parish Share left over from 2023 and this increased by £11,686 during 2024. This meant that we had to sell off a £30,000 portion of the restricted Miss Price Bequest in order to cover this debt by the appointment of a new incumbent.

General Fund income was down on budget projections by £3,315 due to a decrease in Gift Aid Planned Giving, one-off donations and money raised for Outward Giving. Expenditure increased over budget by £1,747 mainly because of vacancy expenses such as an advertisement for a new incumbent. So, the budgeted deficit of £5,426 became an actual deficit of £10,488 which, with the Parish Share shortfall, resulted in the £22,174 deficit shown in the SOFA.

The Fabric Fund this year paid out £945 in roof repairs as required by the Quinquennial Inspection. It also paid £4,895 for a set of new chairs for the Church Centre which have been covered by a small legacy in 2023 which the PCC had designated for this in memory of the donor.

Funds

- The General Fund increased by £7,826 from £11,685 to £19,511.
- The Unrestricted Legacy Fund was unchanged at £1,000.
- The Fabric Fund decreased by £145 from £20,494 to £20,349.
- The "Glass Door" Fund increased by £14,386 from £3,297 to £17,683.
- The Discretionary Fund was unchanged at £2,250.
- The Flower Fund went up by £369 to £1,219 due to the Easter Lilies campaign
- The Restricted Bequest Fund increased by £4,860 but we also withdrew £30,000 so it went from £195,388 to £170,248.

Income

Significant changes were:

- Giving to the General Fund (both with and without Gift Aid) decreased by £1,838 (-5%).
 Regular giving to the Fabric Fund was the same as last year.
- Other Gift Aid giving to the General Fund, including variable weekly Gift Aid donations, decreased by £181 (-6%).

- Unrestricted collections were down by £710 (-14%). Collections for outward giving at £1,150 were significantly down on the £3,370 raised last year due to fewer funerals giving a total decrease of £2,930 (-35%)
- One-off donations to the General Fund at £1,721, were **£653** (-27%) down on last year. The "Glass Door" Fund received a large Gift Aid Donation of £10,000 (plus £2,500 of Gift Aid) compared with £5,280 last year so overall donations were up by £4,383 (57%).
- The Discretionary Fund had no income.
- General Fund Gift Aid tax recovery was down by £1,062 (-10%) while the Fabric Fund was the same as last year. With the Glass Door Gift Aid mentioned above, overall Gift Aid was £1,185 (9%) up on last year.
- Fund raising events did well this year with a net £1,299 taken at the Jumble Sale but only £674 at the Village Fete. Income from Lent Lunches and the BBQ was allocated towards Outward Giving causes. We had a good Quiz Night at the Village Hall which raised a net £1,183 for St John's and the Samson Centre. Porch Produce was down on last year but Sunday Coffee was up making a total of £728, 8% more than last year. We hosted three U3A concerts at St John's this year raising £817. Christmas Events like the Wreath Workshop and the Christmas Tree Festival raised £1,204 for the Glass Door Fund. The 2023 Christmas Quiz raised £291, treated as being in 2024 when all the money came in.
- Wedding & Funeral fees this year were slightly down on last year by £111 (-4%) but only because, during a vacancy, the Diocese lets us keep the Diocesan portion of the fees.
- Church Centre income decreased by £96 (-5%) as U3A had used it for slightly less classes this year.
- Sundry Income included a collection for Sylvia our retiring organist and £54 in the Alms Box. So Sundry was well down by £2,345 (-94%) on last year with no special events.
- Interest payments halved this year from £802 to £404 as we received very little from the nearly empty unrestricted Legacy Fund and dividends were down a little by £121 (-2%).

As a result of the above changes our General Fund income at £62,296 was £7,447 (-11%) down on last year. The big items were the drop in Planned Giving and so the Tax Refund, Donations, Outward Giving and Sundry. The total for all funds decreased by £2,845 to £84,852 (-3%).

Expenditure

Fund Raising costs at £528 were only £15 (-3%) down on last year.

Gifts for Outward Giving causes have been maintained at just under 10% of all income at £6,100, £450 (-7%) down on last year. Money has been given to our 5 regular charities (The Chandler School, The Children's Society, The Samson Centre and Mission Aviation Fellowship and Skillway). There was a significant increase in the money to Chandler School as they have a particular struggle with the number of Special Needs pupils in the school.

We moved to the final year of the phased removal of all subsidies, visible and invisible, from the Parish Share so it would have increased by £9,665 (13%) to £82,829. Because, 3 months into the Vacancy, we decided that we could only afford a part-time minister, our Parish Share dropped back to £63,286.

Carol Mitchell took over as our organist this year which required retrieving almost lost organ playing skills. So, the Honorarium (in Salary and Wages) that we pay an organist was unchanged at £1,680.

With no incumbent, the clergy travelling expenses fell £823 (-88%) to £117. We still had to pay for various services at the Vicarage in the vacancy even with nobody to use them. This included £744, to keep the gas and electricity available. So, Clergy Expenses only dropped slightly from £2,932 to £2,898 (-1%)

Our insurance costs went up by 5% (£3,104 vs £2,956)

Sacristy costs were up by £176 (53%) to £508.

The Organ needed a couple of visits this year down from £450 to £350.

IT and Web services were up by £190 (30%) to £825.

We had to retire our really old black and white printer/copier but not before buying a then unneeded printer cartridge. We moved the Vicarage printer/copier to the vestry as a replacement, but extra consumables and abortive service visits were needed for it raising costs here from £152 to £334.

General Maintenance was £977, down from £1,281. £270 was spent on servicing the Church Centre entrance doors which continue to give trouble.

We cut down on printed copies of the reports for the APCM to save Governance costs.

Utilities costs (gas, electricity, and water) had no subsidies this year but the move away from the Parish Buying Energy Basket to British Gas Lite kept costs down to £3,290 down by 377 (-10%) on last year.

The Church Centre running costs were £44 (5%) up on last year at £841

Total Church Running Expenses were slightly down by £151 (-1%) from £10,486 to £10,355

Sundry Expenses, as shown in the details page, covered the costs of a new fridge for the Church Centre kitchen and a collection for Sylvia (both covered by donations). We made a contribution towards a faculty charge for the Parish Council to check out the grave stones in our closed Churchyard. The big item was the Church Times advertisement for a new incumbent where we paid extra to avoid paying more for repeat ads which we needed since the first round yielded no suitable candidate.

Overall, thanks to the reduction in Parish Share, our General Fund expenditure went down by 9% (£8,610) from £93,080 to £84,470.

Assets

Under the current Charities Act we must show Restricted Fund share investments at their true value, but we are normally only able to spend the income arising and not the capital value of the shares. This money has come from a couple of restricted bequests, so the Fund is now referred to as the (Restricted) Bequest Fund. This year the value went up by £4,860 but we had to sell off £30,000 of the Miss Price Bequest so the value at the end of the year was £170,248 as previously stated. The new chairs for the Church Centre have not been capitalised as an asset.

Forecast

The Parish Share for 2025 has been set at £61,770 although we get a reduction of nearly £1,000 in Extended Vacancy Support from the Diocese until such time as a new incumbent is appointed. With a General Fund deficit in 2024 of £22,000 as basis, the budget for 2025 shows a deficit of £17,473 but with only £19,511 in the General Fund we are very likely to need to sell off the rest of the Miss Price Bequest in order to keep afloat.

As has been the case for some years now, we really need a Stewardship Campaign to push up our regular giving but even finding enough active people to set up a committee let alone find somebody to lead it is proving to be challenging.

The Fabric Fund has £20,349 in it but the initial quote for the stonework repairs required by the Quinquennial Inspection has come in at £11,383 including VAT so that will make a big hole. The Quinquennial also asked us to start saving for what amounts to a complete repointing of the Church stonework, but it is difficult to see how this can be done.

The Glass Door Fund at £17,683 has now got enough money to enable this project to go ahead which is the one bright spot to help make the Church more welcoming.

The Parish Council provided a team of workers who cleared the Churchyard, including the Webb Memorial and will keep it in good order.

Chandler School

Last year saw The Chandler getting back to what we now have to accept as a different "normal".

Classes are back to face-to-face teaching and for visits and excursions as we would hope. The major difference is that the School is a little smaller as three classes have merged into two for two of the year groups. However, the Hub which is used for some of the more

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challenged children both educationally, socially and behaviourally, is functioning as was planned.

School Assemblies, where each week a member of the local Milford and Witley Clergy lead, are up and running and it is really encouraging to see the children seemingly enjoying the "God Input".

The results for the Level 2 Sats, the public exams taken at the end of year 6 before the pupils leave for Senior School, were good and better than the National average. We should all be proud of the children and their teachers who work hard to achieve this result.

Once again, the School Budget is stretched even tighter which has resulted in some further restructuring. Central Government funding is never enough for all the activities that the School would like to undertake. The funding for children with Special Needs is a particular problem for The Chandler and many schools nationally. Perhaps this is a hangover from the pandemic as there are now many more children requiring extra support.

We have finally got back to inviting members of the School community into Church. We held both new arrivals and leavers services in the summer and both were well attended. It is to be hoped that we can do more of this in Church activity for The Chandler and other schools.

The Choir

At the Carol Service in December 2024, however, we were fortunate to be supplemented by singers from Royal Surrey Choir. With the well-known carols, together with the lusty singing by the congregation, we made a heavenly sound and we hope to be able to do this again in 2025

With Mrs Sylvia Foster retiring at the end of 2023, we have been fortunate that Carol Mitchell has filled the role of organist. Carol conducts a choir practice before the 10 o'clock service on the first Sunday and also plays the organ (and sometimes electric piano) on the other Sundays except the second Sunday when Sarah Dunning plays the electric piano.

Of the seven regular singers in the choir, three singers read music, and four do not, so the repertoire for more advanced hymns, part-singing and anthems is rather limited.

When either Carol is unable to attend, or the organ is not working (an increasingly common situation), we are fortunate to have a special library of CDs of all the hymns in the hymn book mostly with organ accompaniment. The CDs are played through a portable CD player with a connecting lead to the sound system.
